Staten Island COVID-19 Vaccination: Setting the Stage

- Staten Island population: 475,000+
- Median household income: \$82,000+
- 21.7% < 18 yrs of age, 17% > 65+ yrs (rapidly growing population)
- Race/ ethnicity:
 - White 74.5%
 - White alone, not Hispanic or Latino 59.6%
 - Hispanic or Latino 18.6%
 - Black or African American 11.6%
 - Asian alone 10.9%
 - American Indian and Alaska Native alone 0.7%
 - Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander alone 0.1%

Staten Island COVID-19 Vaccination: Setting the Stage -- Current Vaccination Rates

- NYC total population
 - o 51% <u>received one dose</u>, 43% <u>fully vaccinated</u>
- Staten Island total population:
 - o 47% received one dose. 41% fully vaccinated
 - Over 65 yrs <u>- 77% received one dose.</u> 71% <u>fully vaccinated</u>

Staten Island COVID-19 Vaccination: Early Efforts with Frontline & Healthcare Providers

- Vaccination roll out in the healthcare sector
 - Richmond University Medical Center (RUMC) & Staten Island University Hospital (SIUH)/Northwell Health frontline staff
 - NH, dialysis centers, adult homes
 - Partnerships
 - Bridging gaps

Broadening Vaccine Education and Access across the Borough

- Keeping Track of Eligible Populations and Influx of Vaccines
- Working with Group Homes and DD Population
- Working with Adult Care Facilities, Skilled Nursing Facilities (SNFs), Congregate Care Settings
- Vaccinating the Senior and homebound populations
- Vaccinating and Educating the Community

Keeping Track of Eligible Populations and Influx of Vaccines

Phase IA and IB roll out

- Early on, vaccines available to hospitals and FQHCs for their staff and to SNFs through Federal pharmacy program
- Once expanded, connected eligible HC workers, first responders to FQHCs and hospitals, those in congregate setting and DD population to pharmacy partners and FQHCs
- Senior population started with 75+, then expanded to 65+



Working with Adult Care Facilities, Skilled Nursing Facilities (SNFs) and other Congregate Care Sites

- SNFs included in federal pharmacy program, but ongoing resources, pharmacy linkages, pop ups needed
- Many residents needed 2nd doses and many staff needed 1st and 2nd doses after Federal pharmacy program completed
- Majority of adult care facilities also included, but those not licensed by State DOH left out
- Pop-ups by LTC pharmacy partner Enexis for residents and staff at 2 adult care facilities; subsequently worked with RUMC for ongoing appts for staff and few residents
- Created linkages between OMH facilities, other residential and congregate settings and LTC pharmacy partners

Working with Group Homes and DD Population

- Early on, FQHCs and Long Term Care (LTC) pharmacies worked with group home staff and residences (congregate care settings)
- Recruited local LTC Pharmacy partner Vitacare/Enexia for DOH approval/registration to administer vaccines
- Group home ambassadors connected to Enexia and to our 5 FQHCs
 - Enexia brought vaccines to group homes + hosted pop up events for staff of multiple group homes under one agency (eg., Catholic Charities)
 - FQHC doctors vaccinated group home staff and eligible residents
- Currently working with DOH and group homes/SNFs to address vaccine hesitancy in staff - survey to identify top reasons for hesitancy, creating vaccine education webinars/workshops and training vaccine champions

Vaccinating the Senior and Homebound Populations

- Started with 75+, then expanded to 65+
 - Kept extensive lists of individuals reaching out to BP's office
 - Collected lists from senior centers, churches, others
 - Helped schedule seniors through the hospitals, FQHCs, City and State hubs and pop ups
 - Hosted multiple-day pop ups at senior centers (eg., JCC)
- Homebound Population
 - Starting a homebound workgroup (Visiting nurses, Northwell home services, CASC, MOW, DFTA, COAD, SI BP, ambulances, volunteers)
 - Working with VCC, Caretender and volunteer ambulance partners to schedule vaccinations for homebound

Vaccinating and Educating the Community

- Community Vaccination Program
 - Partnerships with SI COAD organizations (Project Hospitality, Jewish Community Center, Meals on Wheels, etc.)
 - Partner with Borough President's Office, elected officials, small business, etc.





Vaccinating and Educating the Community

- Helping constituents understand eligibility and connect to vaccine resources (similar to effort with seniors)
- Hosting targeted vaccine pop ups
 - BIPOC communities
 - Homeless shelters
 - Food pantries
 - Restaurant workers
 - Community centers (El Centro)
 - Staff of large social service agencies (Project Hospitality)
 - Local colleges (Wagner, St Johns, CSI)
- Weekly education town halls, community conversations and intimate webinars about the safety of the vaccines and to

address questions/concerns





Engaging Skilled Nursing Facilities & PCPs in Local Vaccine Efforts

- Nursing homes
 - Staff hesitancy (address in small group settings to remedy)
 - Importance of having champions speak about vaccine
- Primary care
 - Role of physicians in improving vaccine rates and addressing barriers/hesitancy

A Community-Based Approach Deepening COVID-19 Vaccine Outreach with Trusted Partners

- Work in advancing vaccination efforts on Staten Island
 - Restaurant workers, youth, communities of color
- Project Hospitality as T2 provider, one of several on SI
 - Coordination with hospitals, pharmacies, schools, etc.
 - Pop-up events
- Project Hope
- Emergency Rental Assistance Program

Community Ambassador Program

- 70+ Community Ambassadors, organization leads across sectors
 - How: recruited key contacts from various sectors (gaps identified from summer 2020 "hot wash") to serve as "Community Ambassadors"
 - Who: emergency communications, mass care, emergency assistance, housing & human services, health and medical, fire, public safety and security, transportation, city agencies, and private/public external affairs
 - What: simple, streamlined role as nodes and amplifiers in borough-wide network across multiple sectors
- Goal: message amplification, resource sharing, emergency response
- Activities:
 - Ongoing targeted communications
 - Periodic meetings for information exchange, resource needs
 - Keep contact lists updated with staffing changes

Hosting/Co-hosting Town Halls, Community Conversations, Educational Webinars

- Partner with CBOs and HC organizations on Town Halls targeting specific populations/communities speakers include trusted partners, health experts, providers
- 400+ participants in SINFPA/COAD programs since July 2020
- February Town Hall
 - 100+ attendees, community leaders and community members
 - Presenters included elected officials, DOHMH
 physicians addressing vaccine hesitancy,
 community representatives and faith-based leaders
 discussing resources and messaging





Borough-wide Needs Assessment Surveys and PPE Distribution

- Determine organizational needs and level of urgency on SI
- Surveys to assess needs for PPE, info, trainings, other resources
- Ongoing PPE Distribution; latest in April: 12,600 KN95 masks;
 3,000 cloth masks; 12,620 face shields
- Total since March 2020: 113,050 KN95 masks; 58700 3-ply masks; 3000 cloth masks; 31400 gloves; 105 gowns; 25700 face shields; 24 gallons hand sanitizer
- Continued assessment of needs through community partner surveys, regular ICS feedback, and ongoing outreach












Staten Island: Stay Strong, Stay Safe Public Messaging Campaign



#SIStayStrongStaySafe public messaging campaign

- Launched in November as an education and outreach effort to keep the borough safe from COVID-19
- Videos, PSAs, social media posts: Core 4, Testing, Get Vaccinated
- Partner with multiple nonprofits and schools to adapt messaging and share on social media






Staten Island COVID-19 Vaccine Task Force

- Launched in May; coordinated effort convened by
 - Staten Island Borough President's Office
 - Staten Island COAD-MES Coalition
 - Staten Island Not for Profit Association (SINFPA)
 - Staten Island Partnership for Community Wellness (SIPCW)
- Borough-wide communication, coordination, cooperation, and collaboration to increase vaccination rates
 - Highlight organizational efforts
 - Break down silos
 - Collectively strategize and unite borough-wide efforts across sectors
 - Members include MES partners, CBO partners, elected officials, community leaders, among others
- Two working groups
 - Pop-ups and Creative Partnerships
 - Vaccine Trust and Messaging

School & Community Vaccination Pop-up Clinics

- Pop ups with schools pharmacy partners provide vaccine for youth as well as their families/friends at a trusted site
- Education webinars for parents prior to pop up
- Ongoing weekly and bi-monthly pop ups at community centers and pantries, particularly in areas with low vaccination rates, high mistrust and health disparities
- Working with pharmacists, doctors and volunteer agency
 Caretender to vaccinate homebound population
- Mobile vaccine sites
